The summer has been a busy period for the AAA Support Service Team attending events to promote the AAASS - these include jobs fairs, sports and community events & grant holder events across Birmingham and Solihull. These events raise awareness of the AAASS service, allowing us to gain feedback on existing services and review ways in which we can further enhance access to autism support services in your local area.

Successful grant applications have now exceeded £800,0000 supporting voluntary sector organisations to provide new & innovative services. AAASS Grant funded projects can be reviewed on line via the AAASS Service Directory with access to the FREE services available through the referral process.

Grants Summary

£804,826

Total grant fund awarded

32 successful organisations have been awarded All Age Autism Support Service grants providing **FREE** services including social and emotional support, guidance on sleep, after school clubs, employability, parental support and many more, all designed to meet the specific needs of autistic people and their families/carers and reflect local issues.

The funding granted so far has supported over 2800 participants of all ages with a range of innovative autism services. Flourish is a community-led network of hyper-local organisations, the aim of which is to reduce health inequalities in west Birmingham. The Roadmap project supports parents who are navigating life with a child with autism.

AAA Services Stakeholder Event

Our Stakeholder event at the Crowne Plaza Hotel in Solihull on 27th September provided an opportunity to bring Commissioners and Professionals within public services together with AAA Grant Holders to discuss the impact of AAA Grant funded projects. The morning opened with Key Note Speech from Autism champion Alex Manners providing an insight into growing up with Asperger's and how the availability of an All Age Autism Support Service would have helped him & his family navigate community autism support services.

We followed with a Q&A session with invited Panel members Dawn Page, Deputy Partnership Manager Serco Leisure, Joanna Statham Inclusion and Engagement Manager DWP, Lee Croft Community Engagement Officer at Solihull Football Club & Alex Manners, exploring the core capabilities required by employers within the Leisure Industries to support people with autism to enter the workforce and access services.



The focus then turned to hearing from participants and carers themselves who shared powerful testimonials about the difference AAA funded projects have made to their lives. This included student RJ who has been attending the **stE.P Up project** – a DJ and music production programmes for autistic and neurodivergent young people managed by Birmingham base **B:Music**.

RJ talked about his passion for music technology but struggled at school. Having started the project in May 2023 RJ has flourished both as a musician and with his confidence. RJ said :
“Everything is done calmly and introduced in a way that suits me. I'm grateful for the charity and I hope the funding continues for others to experience the same as I have.”

New Employability Support Collaboration

A new collaboration forged by AAA Support Services will see Birmingham Community Leisure Trust and Serco Leisure working with four All Age Autism Grants Holder offering employment training and support services across Birmingham and Solihull. <https://www.aadirectory.co.uk/signpost-to-services/aaa-grant-awardees--referral-options-here>

United Support Group has started delivering Drop In Employment Advice sessions at Leisure Centres around north Birmingham while Caudwell Children is currently recruiting for their on-line employability training for young people recognising the opportunities to focus on careers in the sports and leisure industry.

The collaboration with Community Leisure Trust, who manage nine leisure centres across Birmingham, will create new work experience placements feeding into other projects such as Experts by Experience Solihull's volunteering and employment support project running in Solihull. The collaboration will also involve Autism West Midlands delivering employer autism awareness training to Serco Leisure Centre managers in October to ensure a wider understanding of workplace adjustments & support to provide sustainable employment to autistic candidates.

News about the AAA Service Directory

User Experience Focus Groups: Further consultation into how we can improve the functionality of Online AAA Support Service Directory has taken place over the summer. Following the Hackathon at Birmingham City University, MSc student Mahima Shrestha, from Department of Digital Media Technology held a series of User Experience focus groups to gain further feedback from autistic service users themselves and parents/carers of autistic children accessing Children’s Quarter summer activities programme.

Launch of Translation tool: Prioritising accessibility has led to the Directory now incorporating a translation tool so that people can access information where English is their 2nd language. This development went live as part of AAA Support Service attendance at the DWP Event for International Literacy Day which took place in August in partnership with Refugee Employment Network.

Making information available which is accessible and easy to understand is central to AAA Support Services. We are constantly reviewing all information and the range of channels and formats which will best meet the needs of people with autism, their families and carers.

AAA App Development

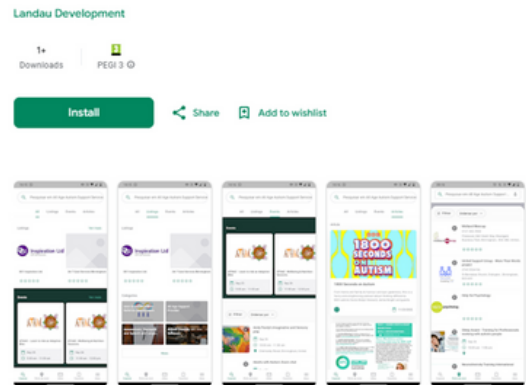

The launch of the AAA App offers increased convenience and the ability to access information and refer into services while on the go.

Whether using the new App or logging onto the website via other devices the easy referral process continues to provides access to the free support services available through grant-awarded projects as follows:
